Growing

My dear Christ Church family,

It is said that the Christian walk is much like riding a bicycle: we are either moving forward or falling off. I believe that is true! Saint Gregory of Nyssa (c. 335–394) even went so far as to define "sin" as "the refusal to keep growing."

No matter our age, we are in continuous need of growing spiritually. We used to talk about "Christian Education", but more and more, churches (especially Episcopal churches) are getting away from that phrase. "Education" implies *intellectual* learning – and growing spiritually involves so much more than just intellectual learning! More and more, therefore, we are using the term "Christian *Formation*". We are *formed* into the image of Christ – we grow into Christ – not simply by "head learning", but by spiritual practice, prayer, silence, spending time in nature (which Richard Rohr calls "God's first Bible"), worship, singing, listening to music, etc.

I am very pleased that we offer many opportunities for Christian Formation at Christ Church. For children, we continue to offer Sunday School, lovingly taught by Shirleen Sabatino. This year it will be offered during the 9:00am hour, in order that parents of our children might join our new Faith-Seeking Journey. (There will be a nursery from 9:00am-11:15am.) Older children and youth have the opportunity to serve as acolytes during worship – another formational activity. Youth can participate in the diocesan Genesis and Quest weekends at Frontier Ranch. This past year, we were privileged to be able to join the Episcopal Churches in Colorado Springs in joint activities: some of our youth participated in a weekend retreat at Cathedral Ridge, a Middle School Mission Trip to Leadville, and Summer Camp at Cathedral Ridge. (I met just yesterday with leaders of these Colorado Springs Churches to begin planning next summer's mission trips.) Pastor Bob Kippley from Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church and I have arranged to offer a monthly "youth group" gathering this year (see information elsewhere in this newsletter). Also this year our youth who are 16 or older will have the opportunity to join the youth from the Colorado Springs Episcopal Churches in a joint monthly Confirmation Class. (We are looking for adult Mentors – please talk with me if you are willing.)

For adults, we continue to offer Bible Studies for men and woman, a Centering Prayer Group, and Daughters of the King (an Episcopal women's society committed to prayer). pb Walsh continues her gracious offer to teach, one-on-one, contemplative prayer to anyone who asks her. She also tends our bookshelves in the parish hall, keeping them stocked with books and recordings which can help in our Christian Walk. This Fall, we are blessed to have Mary Derbort, a member of St. Michael's Church and a friend to many of us, teach a new "BeFrienders" course at Christ Church on Tuesday afternoons (2-4pm), beginning Oct. 15. (I will be taking that course, and I encourage you to also consider it. See elsewhere in this newsletter for more information, and visit www.befrienderministry.org/.) Of course, our big new exciting offering this year is The Faith-Seeking Journey, which I strongly encourage all adults to consider joining. (See more information elsewhere in this newsletter – and please sign up soon, so that we may order materials.)

Why not consider taking advantage of these wonderful opportunities for spiritual formation and growth – and invite a neighbor to join you?

I suspect that there is nothing more crucial to true spiritual *comfort*... than being able from time to time to stop that chatter including the chatter of spoken

Prayer Practice III

Centering Prayer

'In the body there is a little shrine. In that shrine there is a lotus. In that lotus there is a little space. What is it that lives in that little space? The whole universe is in that little space, because the source of it all is in the heart of each one of us."

--Parable from the Upanishads

"Listen...and incline the ear of thy heart..." That's from the first line of the prologue to the Rule of St. Benedict written for monastic life in the 6th century. But how does one "incline the ear of thy heart?"

I'm going to ask you to perform an interesting exercise. Don't worry. It won't last any longer than 20 minutes and does not involve physical exertion. Sit comfortably and calmly in a chair in a quiet place, both feet on the floor, your hands in your lap folded or open, and your eyes gently closed. Take a couple of deep breaths. Relax. Begin to notice the thoughts flicking through your mind, letting them come and go as if you were a mere observer and not heeding them or giving them any energy at all. You may find yourself thinking about the past or the future, what you should be doing or what you have already done. You may feel remorse for an injury you caused or resentment over an injury you received. Whatever the thoughts are, just let them come and go. Watch them. Don't engage them. If during the process you find yourself carried off by a particular thought, gently bring your attention back to the present moment, without judging yourself. Some people use a sacred word, such as "Abba" or "Jesus," to help them get off the "thought train." Others merely focus on their breath. After about 15 or 20 minutes, gently come out of the exercise.

You will probably notice several things. First, your thought stream is almost constant. Second, you will observe that your mind often jumps from one thought to another. Buddhists call this the "monkey mind." You may also notice that the same "tapes" tend to play over and over again in your mind. This is the "noise" that we all live with that hinders us from St. Benedict's call to "listen."



But, you say, I cannot stop my thoughts. And for the most part you are right, of course. In fact, by consciously trying to stop your thoughts you are engaging in one more thought. However, if you practice consistently and often, perhaps once or twice per day, over time you will come to an interesting, even startling, realization: you are not your thoughts. Your deeper self (the observer) exists independently of your thoughts, separate from the noise of your daily existence. With practice this exercise becomes contemplative prayer where you may find a quiet, silent "place" beneath the stream of conscious thought to commune in silence with the Holy Spirit.

John O'Donohue, a wonderful Irish Catholic poet and philosopher, put it this way: "The soul has two faces. One face is turned towards

our lives; it animates and illuminates every moment of our presence. The other face is always turned towards the divine presence. Here the soul receives the Divine Smile or the Kiss of God, as Meister Eckhart might express it." O'Donohue, Beauty.

Meditation is a beautiful form of prayer where we create interior space amidst the noise of our lives to allow the Holy Spirit to indwell. It is the room Jesus calls us to when he said, "When you pray, go into your private room, shut yourself in, and so pray to your Father who is in that secret place, and your Father who sees all that is done in secret will reward you. In your prayers do not babble as the gentiles do, for they think that by using many words they will make themselves heard." (Matt. 6:6-7). Jesus invites us often to this place where we "who travail and are heavy laden, may be refreshed." (Matt. 11:28).

Of course, meditation can take many forms. What is described above is one form of what is often called centering prayer. If you want to learn more about it, we have a centering prayer group at Christ Church. We will look at another form of meditation next time in this prayer practice series.

What is The Faith-Seeking Journey?

The Faith-Seeking Journey is a program (perhaps "experience" would be more accurate) through which participants share their faith, doubts, questions, and learn the foundational teachings of the Church in areas such as Church History, Bible, Prayer, etc. As a Foundations Course, The Faith-Seeking Journey can serve many purposes: 1) It can be an introduction to Christianity and the Episcopal tradition for those who are new to the Church; 2) It can be a refresher for longtime members of the Episcopal Church, helping them deepen their faith; and 3) It can serve as instruction for those preparing to be Baptized (or parents/godparents of those being Baptized), Confirmed, Received, or those Reaffirming their Faith.

There are four stages or phases in the program, corresponding to the seasons of the Church Year:



- 1. It begins in September with the **Inquiry Period**, during which time the focus is on Story -- both the faith stories of each individual and the faith story of the Church. We meet people where they are in their faith journey, and share with them the collective faith journey of the Christian Church down through the centuries. The Inquiry Period lasts through the end of the Pentecost Season (last Sunday before Advent).
- 2. At the end of the Inquiry Period, participants can decide whether they want to make the commitment to continue on into the next phase, the **Formation Period**. If so, there is a brief covenanting ceremony during worship on the First Sunday in Advent. During the Formation Period, the focus is on the Liturgy of the Word (the Bible). The Inquiry Period lasts through the seasons of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.
- 3. At the end of the Formation Period, participants can decide whether they want to make the commitment to continue on into the next phase, the **Enlightenment**

Period. If so, there is a brief covenanting ceremony during worship on the First Sunday in Lent. The Enlightenment Period focuses on Prayer (using the Book of Common Prayer and other resources). The Enlightenment Period ends with a festive celebration of The Great Vigil of Easter early on Easter morning, at which time participants who have not been baptized may choose to be baptized. The Great Vigil of Easter becomes the most important service of the year, as it was in the ancient Church. A festive Easter Brunch is held after the Vigil.

4. At the end of the Enlightenment Period, participants can decide whether they want to make the commitment to continue on into the next phase, the **Initiation Period**. The Initiation Period focuses on the Sacraments and on Ministry. Participants are helped to discern the ministry/ministries to which God is calling them. The Initiation Period continues through the Easter Season, ending on Pentecost, when participants are commissioned in their new ministries. It is our Bishop's practice to celebrate Regional Confirmations during the Easter Season, and those participants who choose to be Confirmed or to Reaffirm their Faith will do so at that Regional Confirmation service.

When will the course be offered?

The Faith-Seeking Journey will be offered beginning Sunday, September 22, 2013 from 9:00am-9:45am. This is currently the time when our Adult Class is being offered. It is hoped that in the first year of The Faith-Seeking Journey, most current participants in the Adult Class will decide to participate in FSJ.

What is the cost?

The Church supplies a student manual and a Serendipity Bible for each participant to use.

How do I sign up?

A sign-up sheet is on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall. You may also call the Parish Office, 275-2028, and tell Becky you want to sign up for The Faith-Seeking Journey.

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Eating Your True Self

Jesus says, "If you eat this bread you will live forever" (John 6:51). It is so interesting that he chooses taste, flavor, and nutrition as the symbol of how life is transferred, and not intellectual cognition. If you live by the momentary identity that others give you, that's what dies when you die, and you're left with nothing. Your relative identity passes away, but it is like the painful erasing of an unwanted tattoo. When Jesus says he's giving himself to you as the "bread of life," he's saying, as it were, "Find yourself in me, and this will not pass or change or die. Eat this food as your primary nutrition, and you are indestructible." This is your absolute and indestructible identity.

We all slowly learn how to live in what Thomas Merton would call the True Self—who you are, and always have been, in God. Who you are in God is who you forever are. In fact, that's all you are, and it is more than enough. Everything else is passing away. Reputations, titles, possessions, and roles do not determine our identity. When I hand out the Eucharistic bread I love to say to the assembly, "You become what you eat. Come and eat who you are—forever!" You access Great Truth by absorption and digestion, almost never by analysis or argumentation.
